Mayor Wallace Benson is not a candidate for council at Tuesday's election, but bets are being made as soon as the filing deadline, nevertheless, that he will be on the council next month.

Benson's term is expiring next month with Councilman Charles and Ildo Rosellini. None of the three filed for re-election. But of "write-in" for Mr. Benson as soon as the filing deadline passed and has risen in

## City Pursues Disaster Fund Recompense

Belmont is not settling its \$23,247 bill for Ralston avenue repairs without two struggles.

City Administrator Fred Nelson has reported receipt of \$3,070.90 from the state office of civil defense from flood disaster funds toward Belmont's expense in restoring upper Ralston after December's storm-flood.

But it's still possible half the remainder—\$10,000-plus—may come through the state division of highways on a matching-fund deal, Mr. Nelson said.

Besides this source, there's the possibility, too, that Piombo Construction can be proved responsible as the City claims, for ponding water on its upper Ralston tract. This trapping of storm water, the City contends, resulted in the eruptive breaching of the highway opposite the Piombo tract.

In the meantime, costs of maintenance of all Ralston avenue since January 1 of last year are being compiled for consideration by the City council, Mr. Nelson said. On that date the about 3½-mile length

## Census Starts; 25% Population Gain Possible

Population figures in Belmont were being gathered today as the Bureau of the Census of the Department of Commerce worked on a special census requested by this city late last year.

According to the estimate of Mrs. Marion R. Brown of San Francisco, census supervisor in charge, a total of 11,900 residents may be tabulated. This represents an increase approaching 25% more than the special census of February, 1954. The total then was 9505.

On Monday afternoon Mrs. Brown interviewed applicants for the 15 enumerator and clerical jobs. On Tuesday morning the selectees entered a training class, then went into the field that afternoon. They are all local, almost entirely Belmonters, paid at the rate of 6 cents a name.

Announcement of a tentative census total may be made by the local census office in two weeks, with the final tabulation results to be issued officially

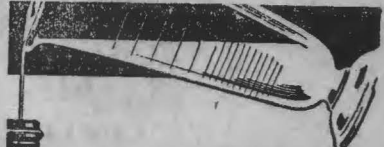
